By the time you receive this article in the Evergreen, the postal world is going to look like a much different place; it looks much different than last WEEK (Today is May 18). My point is this - there isn't much use for me to go into particulars about the POSTPlan. By the time you read this you will have decided whether or not to take the incentive to retire, you will know whether you or all in or not for at least the next two years, and the first round of limited competition offices will have been posted. Just from the point in time between beginning and finishing this article, a change has taken place: the list of offices to upgrade was published. I've no doubt that within the next few weeks there will have been changes to the POSTPlan, as is predicted by the USPS itself. The NAPUS national website at www.napus.org is the most comprehensive source of information on the changes.

What a difficult day that was to hear that the services of Postmasters will not play as crucial a role in the ongoing story of the

Postal Service as they have in the past. We know the sacrifices and sweat we have endured in our positions, the heart and the loyalty we have offered. Ultimately, the position of Postmaster is a job, but to so many it is a vocation. I understand the feelings of sadness, hurt, and anger I hear when I talk to you. I also hear the celebration of those that are taking the opportunity to retire...Congratulations!

One thing I am heartened by is that so many of you in offices to be downgraded are THAT close to retirement, though unfortunately perhaps earlier than you hoped or planned for. I am grateful to NAPUS and the other management organizations for mitigating the even more aggressive reform plans USPS had in mind. Certainly I wish POSTPlan weren't taking place, but there is measured gratitude for the approach~ the two year waiting period, the incentive and VER, the limited-competition vacancy postings. There appears to be some sense of recognition on behalf of USPS of the many years of public service so many of us have offered.

Let me say that I'm not sure that everyone comprehends that NAPUS is not a union; we have no collective bargaining power. We have the consultative process; we are in an advisory position working with Headquarters in a process more akin to mediation. Some question if we could/should try to fight this initiative in Congress. Because we came

to agreement with Headquarters on this compromise (the initial USPS plan was much more damaging to us), there is not much of a legislative leg to stand on; we would be fighting against the very thing we agreed to. As well, many of those in Congress who fully support a future for the Postal Service find POSTPlan to be a satisfactory alternative to closing post offices.

So between the time I'm writing this and publication, some very crucial things will take place and I can only imagine where we will be then. Very likely there will be many active Postmasters who will feel in limbo, you will not have taken the incentive and you won't yet have a more secure position. The thing I encourage you to do is fight for your place in the Postal Service. Don't think that something is not possible because you haven't done it before. Talk to your MPOO about an OIC position; seek assistance from the Portland and Seattle District Learning Management offices in either creating an eCareer profile or strengthening the one you already have. Be vocal and be persistent. Be proactive. This fall there will be another round of Postmaster vacancies that only Postmasters can apply for, so you need to start acting now if you have not already. There will possibly be a third round of postings - that will be determined later. If it is better suited for you to transfer into a craft position or some other function

within the District, speak with your MPOO. The goal is to find a spot for every Postmaster that desires to stay with the Postal Service, but you need to do your part in finding that position. Very shortly after you receive this Evergreen our State Convention will take place in Ferndale. A reduced registration is available until June 23 (the date by which it must be received by the Registration Chair). Even if you can't register until the last minute or if you can only make it for one day, I encourage you to attend; the weekend will definitely be POSTPlan-centric, with the most up-to-date information being shared. Presentations on eCareer and SOV calculations are essential for those Postmasters whose offices are downgrading. Friday the 28th we will have as guests both National President Bob Rapoza (in person), and via Skype, our Government Relations Director Bob Levi. On Saturday the 29th we will be hosting the Seattle District Human Resources Manager, Dan Foster. At this date neither District Manager has committed to attend, but check our state website, www.napuwa.com, for the most current information.

USPS videos for employees thinking about the good life

New retirement counseling videos for Civil Service Retirement System and Federal Employees Retirement System employees now are available at LiteBlue. The new videos are for the benefit of employees who have started the retirement process and have already received their paperwork. They also will be useful for employees within five years of retirement who want to learn more about retirement benefits and the paperwork involved. The counseling videos include the same information retirement specialists at the Human Resources Shared Services Center would give employees over the phone. But unlike a telephone conversation, each 20-minute session can be viewed as many times as employees need. And they can pause to finish paperwork or rewind to review information. The new counseling videos at LiteBlue are in addition to a set of general retirement videos which includes information for new or younger employees as well as those preparing to retire. The general retirement videos are not available on ACE computers.

The House has yet to pass a bill that would merge with S1789. As Legislative Chair I attend a telecom with National Napus Government Relations Director Bob Levi weekly. On our last telecom he told us that Congress will be taking a two week break over Memorial Day and most likely will not take up any legislation until June. Please keep in touch with your Senators and Representatives, especially the Republicans and tell them as a NAPUS mem-

ber you support S1789 and not HR 2309 as it stands. Talking Points

- Urge Representatives to tell the House Leadership to bring Senate-passed bipartisan S. 1789 for a House vote.
 - o S. 1789 helps ensure that rural communities continue to have access to maximum postal services.
 - Advise the Representatives that HR 2309 places at risk postal-dependent communities, and passage would place in harm's way their district's post offices.
 - o HR 2309 includes post office closing commission, which jeopardizes rural access to postal services (Senate soundly defeated commission proposal 30-69)

o HR 2309 eliminates requirement that the USPS provide a "maximum degree of" service to rural communities

o HR 2309 eliminates prohibition against closing a post office solely for having expenses that exceed revenue

• NAPUS strongly believes that House bill should include post office closing review by the Post Regulatory Commission, with the binding authority on community post office appeals.

Many of our Legislators will be in our home communities over their break so if you can attend a function they are having please do so and reinforce our stance and concerns.

Bob Levi has accepted Michelle Lee's invitation to attend our State convention via Skype. Since it will be the end of June perhaps we will be hearing about more movement in Congress. One can only hope.

On a more personal note I sent my paperwork in. I am taking the VER and will retire effective July 31st with 32 years WOO HOO!!! Retirees here I come! God Bless,

Pat Van de Brake, retired United States Postmaster, died March 10, 2012 in Bellingham, Washington. Pat was born at home and raised in tiny Thorp, Washington, the only daughter of Lillian and James Brain and sister to two fabulous brothers. Pat followed in her mother's foot-

steps who served as Postmaster in Thorp for 40 years before having to retire under the mandatory retirement policy in place at that time. Pat entered the Postal Service in 1945 serving as a Post Office clerk. Her father, newly elected to the House of Representatives and scheduled to begin his term in Olympia in January 1951, succumbed to a heart attack on December 18, 1950 while pulling out of the driveway with a carload of canvas, locked mailbags, stuffed inside, in the trunk and piled out on the hood, during the Christmas rush. The mail made it to the train. Quite the postal service legacy in Thorp for this family.

Upon her appointment in 1973 as she was announced the

new United States Postmistress in Thorp, Washington, she declared she would never be anyone's mistress and assumed her beloved role as Postmaster until her retirement in 1983.

Pat and her husband Earl (Van) raised seven children in Thorp. Pat loved working in the Post Office and serving the community forming lifelong friendships along the way. In 1990 Pat and Van moved to Stanwood, Washington. She took enormous pride in her job and remained fiercely loyal to the Post Office until her last day. Pat is survived by six children, many grandchildren and great grandchildren. A memorial Mass will be held in Ellensburg, Washington on September 8, 2012.

However, by the time you read this, you will have already answered that question, or at least you should have...the Postal Service did extend the deadline for making that decision in the current VER to July 2nd. The original deadline was extended by one week so that you could take advantage of some office openings that have been posted in the first round. There will be a 'second round', but that will come in August or September, AFTER those that take the VER will have already retired. Who knows what offices will open...however, that second posting is supposed to be 'service wide' rather than District wide, so again who knows (at this time) what offices will be open, and who will apply for them. The

competition should be intense, since service-wide means anyone that has ever wanted to relocate to your great state can apply for the openings. The service is also offering a VER to craft personnel as they intend to close/consolidate a large number of mail processing facilities, possible one or more in your state, so there will be a lot of movement in the craft ranks as well as the Postmaster and supervisor ranks. Again, a crapshoot for most Postal employees.

My significant other and I, both long time Postmasters, have deliberated long and hard on the possibility of retiring. She is currently eligible, and I will be in mid-July, so we both could take up their 'offer'. We are financially stable enough to do so, but have decided not to retire at this time (sorry everyone, but that means that neither her office nor mine will be included in either round of open-

ings). We have decided to hold on for two more years, until the deadline for downgrading offices comes into effect, at which time her office is scheduled to become a Level 6. The VER offer just wasn't lucrative enough to make immediate retirement viable for us. Since neither of us intends to leave the area we live/work in, that leaves out our putting in for any of the office vacancies available in either the first or second round. You don't have to worry about either of us being your 'competition' if you plan on applying for any of them.

So what should YOU do? First and foremost, don't make any rash decisions; retirement is permanent and affects the rest of your life. If you haven't already done so, go into eCareer and create your profile, so if you decide to try to promote, you will be ready to apply. Creating your profile takes time and thought, and the postings will be short in duration; time is something you will not have a lot of if you wait too long. Another thing I think is a must is financial planning. There are numerous options and companies available to assist you in this (if you're

like me, and not sharp enough in this area to make these decisions without assistance). Regardless of your age, length of service, and whether the Postal Service will be your exit point into retirement or not, these decisions take time and thought, and preparation in advance is a must!

Will you be able to continue living the life style you are accustomed to (or want to become accustomed to)? Will you be able to continue to live in your community? Do you want to move, or retire to another location? Do you have the support of your family and loved ones in the decisions you make? Do you want to pursue another career outside of the Postal Service? If so, do you have the skill set to do so? Are you unencumbered enough to do so, or will you be by the time you have to make the decision?

The only thing that changes is...everything. To retire or not to retire; that is only one of the questions.
